Bringing Out the Best in Others Lifting others up is what she does. Dr. Patti Hill is an accomplished teacher, administrator, psychologist and small-business owner. But it isn't her impressive resume that she'll mention when you ask what's important to her. "The purpose of my life on this earth is to help others achieve their potential. If I'm not doing that, I should be!"

Dr. Hill makes it her mission to find the potential in others and to create an environment that helps them thrive. "I always see the good in people," she says.

Every step in Dr. Hill's career was made because she believed in doing her part to ensure others could achieve their dreams. When she was asked to teach special education in secondary school, she agreed and then promptly enrolled in a master's program focusing on teaching the deaf and hard of hearing.

While she was a young teacher, Dr. Hill's Uncle Eddie, who was deaf, had shared stories with her about the difficulty of traveling to distant boarding schools to be educated. Even then, he wasn't allowed to use sign language in school. She hoped she could make education better for students like her uncle.

While working as a teacher of deaf students, Dr. Hill was presented with the results of student testing performed by school psychologists. They informed her that although the students did well in visual perception, they scored low in verbal skills. Stunned, Dr. Hill used American Sign Language as she responded, "You didn't even sign to them!"

She knew her students couldn't achieve their full potential if they couldn't even use their primary source of communication. She didn't want the same thing to happen to them that had happened to her uncle Eddie, so she began taking psychology classes to create a better way to assess students. Classes eventually turned into a doctorate degree, and now she's a licensed psychologist. Dr. Hill served for a time as principal at a specialty school for children with severe speech and language development challenges in Edmonton, Alberta, Canada. She also started a consultancy business using her knowledge and experience to help government agencies design and implement better programs for children, youth and their families, which she's been running for more than 40 years.

Dr. Patti Hill devoted her life to making the world a better place. Along the way, she found Lions. Actually, Lions found her.

As of 07/20/23 – we have 120 of 300 volunteer spots filled: representing 17 of our 64 clubs. HELP us get this event FULL of Lions members and representation from every club!

On September 9, 2023, Lions members from District 5M9 will be coming together to pack 130,000+ meals that will ultimately be distributed to communities within 5M9. <u>This is a district wide event</u>. We are hoping to have all 64 clubs within 5M9 participate.

Those clubs that sign up to participate will also be bringing the packed meals BACK TO THEIR communities for distribution.

As Lions, we know that HUNGER is a global cause for our service organization. This meal packing event allows us, as Lions, to <u>have direct impact on food insecurity</u> right in the communities that we live. We will pack the food – we will distribute the food. Our communities will be receiving the food.





<u>Frequently asked questions</u> <u>about Phishing</u> <u>How do you identify phishing</u> <u>scams?</u>

The primary goal of any phishing scam is to steal sensitive information and credentials. Be wary of any message (by phone, email, or text) that asks for sensitive data or asks you to prove your identity.



Attackers work hard to imitate familiar entities and will use the same logos, designs, and interfaces as brands or individuals you are already familiar with. Stay vigilant and don't click a link or open an attachment unless you are certain the message is legitimate.

Here are some tips for recognizing a phishing email:

Urgent threats or calls to action (for example: "Open immediately").

New or infrequent senders—anyone emailing you for the first time.

Poor spelling and grammar (often due to awkward foreign translations).

Suspicious links or attachments—hyperlinked text revealing links from a different IP address or domain.

Subtle misspellings (for example, "microsoft.com" or "rnicrosoft.com")

How do you report a phishing attack?

If you receive a suspicious message in your Microsoft Outlook inbox, choose Report message from the ribbon, and then select Phishing. This is the fastest way to remove the message from your inbox. In Outlook.com, select the check box next to the suspicious message in your inbox, select the arrow next to Junk, and then select Phishing.

If you've lost money or been the victim of identity theft, report it to local law enforcement and get in touch with the Federal Trade Commission. They have an entire website dedicated to resolving issues of this nature.

Does phishing only occur with emails?

No. While phishing is most common over email, phishers also use phone calls, text messages, and even web searches to obtain sensitive information.

What is the difference between spam and phishing?

Spam emails are unsolicited junk messages with irrelevant or commercial content. They may advertise quick money schemes, illegal offers, or fake discounts.

Phishing is a more targeted (and usually better disguised) attempt to obtain sensitive data by duping victims into voluntarily giving up account information and credentials.

The dangers of phishing emails

A successful phishing attack can have serious consequences. This might look like stolen money, fraudulent charges on credit cards, lost access to photos, videos, and files—even cybercriminals impersonating you and putting others at risk.

At work, risks to your employer could include loss of corporate funds, exposure of customers' and coworkers' personal information, sensitive files being stolen or being made inaccessible, not to mention damage to your company's reputation. In many cases, the damage can be Irreparable.

Fortunately, there are many solutions for protecting against phishing-both at home and at work.

Quick tips for avoiding phishing

Don't trust display names

Check the sender's email address before opening a message—the display name might be a fake.

Check for typos

Spelling mistakes and poor grammar are typical in phishing emails. If something looks off, flag it.

Look before clicking

Hover over hyperlinks in genuine-sounding content to inspect the link address.

Read the salutation

If the email is addressed to "Valued Customer" instead of to you, be wary. It's likely fraudulent.

Review the signature

Check for contact information in the email footer. Legitimate senders always include them.

Beware of threats

Fear-based phrases like "Your account has been suspended" are prevalent in phishing emails.
