

'Locks of Love'



Do you know this guy? Well, he's been a Lion since 2000, has been a club president twice, is currently club secretary and has served as a District 5M-9 cabinet member for three years. Now, as they say, here's the "rest of the story." On April 11, 1977, I lost my father to complications from brain cancer. On July 2, 2006, my mother, her strength weakened from battling a melanoma in her maxillary sinus, passed away from heart & artery complications. For the past year a very close friend has been battling pancreatic cancer. Very recently a high school classmate was diagnosed with pancreatic cancer. While I have my health, there are many people who have battled or are currently battling various forms of cancer and other debilitating disease.

As we all know, one of the side effects of many aggressive treatments, including that for cancer, is the loss of hair. So, last February, I made a conscious decision that I would grow my hair to donate it to Locks of Love, providing it meets their criteria. Locks of Love is a public non-profit organization that provides hairpieces to financially disadvantaged children under age 18 suffering from long-term medical hair loss from any diagnosis [www.locksoflove.org]. Even though my hair color is not used to make hairpieces for the recipients, it will be sold to offset the costs of making the custom fit hairpieces, which can cost \$3,500.00 to \$6,000.00. Adult hairpieces do not fit children so these hairpieces are specifically made to fit each child, thus the high cost.

Now, here's my plan and my challenge. I will let my hair grow until the 2011 Mid-Winter Convention, at which time it should be long enough to cut and donate. I am going to make a big deal of this because, one, it will benefit kids in need, and two, it follows the Lions' motto. What's my challenge to the Lions of 5M-9? Those of who can, grow your hair long and donate it to Locks of Love. Yes, "Second Dude" Norby, you too can do this. I read in a recent Leader Dog "Mane Event" [www.leaderdog.org/lions/maneevent/2009/TheManeEvent-Issue6-2009.pdf], that Gary Klop, the vice district governor for Single District 10 on the Upper Peninsula of Michigan, has challenged his district with a very unique way to raise some money. "Gary's Hairy Fundraiser" has Gary growing his hair and goatee for two years, his length

of time as VDG and DG. He has done this fundraiser before and raised over \$1,700 in past efforts. While this Lions' challenge is strictly raising money, my challenge is two-fold. Grow your hair to donate to Locks of Love, and, each club who has a participant or participants in this challenge donate \$50.00 to \$100.00 to be sent to Locks of Love as well. Let's do this as district 5M-9 and send everything in as one donation, hair and money.

Have you figured out who I am? I have been a member of the Park Rapids Lions for 9 years and one of the 5M-9 Leader Dog co-chairs for 3 years. Presently, my locks are about 4-5 inches long and must be at least 12 inches long to donate. Even though my hair is 'white' and won't be used to make hairpieces, I am still going through with this project. I really can't wait until my all-school reunion next summer to see the reaction of my classmates since I graduated with very short hair, as shown in my 1965 graduation photo. At the time of my graduation, one of my classmates likened my hairstyle to that of those four lads from Liverpool. Not!!!



Bar fight 25 years ago left man blind

It was Sept. 15, 1984, when Gerald Johnson's eyesight was lost during an accident.

"It's been 25 years," he said, "since I was stuck down as a pedestrian in Elizabeth, Minnesota."

Since then, besides his blindness, he has dealt with a lost sense of smell, hearing loss, regaining his balance, reoccurring seizures and depression.

"I've had a lot of ups and downs over the years," he said.

But, at the advice of his psychologist, he decided to not only revisit the night of the accident, but to write it down. Instead of a simple journal, he has written an autobiography, with the assistance of Bill Mohn, about his life story.

Mohn said at the time, he was a stay-at-home dad, and it was a good fit to help with

the book.

Although Johnson agreed with his therapist that it would be tough to revisit, he started doing some research. He contacted the Otter Tail County Sheriff's Office, his attorney in Fergus Falls and contacted others involved in the accident, which started as a bar fight.

His mom, Janet, started reading the documents to him.

"It was very good," Johnson said. "At times, my mom would stop and try to control herself. 'Do you want me to continue?'"

Johnson said that after 45 days in a coma, he only remembered so much of what had happened. He heard a variety of stories from those involved. Doing the research, he learned the truth about that night.

"I need to go through and get all this out," he confided.

Since his accident, four people from that night have died. Two of the men involved chose not to talk with Johnson about what happened, but he let them know he was going forward with the book.

To get it all down, Johnson would record on cassette his memories and stories. Mohn said he started with six or seven tapes, which he listened to and took notes. The stories were in no particular order, so it made it more challenging for Mohn to get a story down.

He said he ended up with about 30 pages of legal pad notes, which he color coded to organize.

"I started to see patterns emerge in his life story," he said.

So, he organized the color coded notes into chronological time periods.

"It was the best way I could figure out to make it work," Mohn said.

So with some research, cassette tapes and creative challenges to fill in the gaps, the book came to fruition.

That night 25 years ago started as a celebration. Johnson, who was 21 at the time, was serving as an usher in the wedding of two friends. After rehearsal, it was a Friday night, the group drove to Elizabeth from Fergus Falls for some drinks.

There was an altercation in the bar, and it moved outside. Johnson, stepping in to break up the fight, was hit by a car. In November of 2006, he met with the driver of that car.

"He regrets his participation in that night," Johnson said.

And although he told the man he has forgiven him, it's not likely he'll forget. Johnson said thought that he had to move on or he'd be eaten up inside.

"It's hard to forget. I wake up the same way every morning.

"We had a nice talk. I told the driver thanks for coming out and I want to hear your side of it," he said of the meeting.

A former friendship has sparked again after meeting with an old co-worker that Johnson was always told started the altercation in the first place. In fact, it was one of the two men that wouldn't talk to him that started it.

"My old co-worker and I have buried the hatchet and become friends again," he said.

Johnson spent 45 days in a coma and 45 days recovering and attending therapy before returning home from the hospital.

He said reliving the incident "was very painful" but it helped him as well. "I finally got my peace of mind out of it."

Since some of the details remained vague, Mohn said he had to draw more information out of Johnson.

"I had to get inside his mind. A few times we would get together and I'd ask him some more questions," Mohn said.

Once Mohn had a copy he was happy with,

Simply said, War is Hell and combat veterans live with this mental battle every day. That's why Project New Hope was established, to help combat veterans and their families cope in their daily lives.

Individuals who have been in the combat veterans boots, know exactly what they have gone through and started Project New Hope. In fact, when the Veterans are discharged, the combat zone doesn't stay there. It travels home with them in their minds and begins to affect their family life when they return. These combat veterans just can't come home and pick up where they left off. They can't sit down in front of the TV and enjoy the good old days with old friends. The combat veteran themselves sometimes don't even know what is wrong and blame the slightest thing on loved ones and friends.

Have you ever gone from a calm, loving individual to someone who snaps in a split second and is lost in a time warp. This can be any Veteran who has served in combat and has come home to a world that they have been absent from for sometime. A combat veteran can't just close the door to the combat area the day they are sent home. They can't come home and resume the life they knew before they left for combat. Their world has been turned upside down and they need time and counseling to return to some kind of normal life style. This is

where Project New Hope can help, with professionals, family, friends and the veterans themselves to help recognize a problem and get help.

Individuals, who understand what the veteran has gone through, started Project New Hope. They too have come home and found their worlds turned upside down, lived with the confusion of returning home and not knowing what was wrong. A fancy name for all of this is, Post Traumatic Syndrome.

Realizing a problem will help the healing process and help understand the need to continue with the success of life after the war. Returning home, the soldier is met with challenges and transitions of combat to home. This is where Project New Hope can help. The soldier feels it is their fault and often feels alone and depressed. The family can't understand why the soldier can't resume the lifestyle they left before deployment. There is confusion, anger, abuse, withdrawal and sometimes suicide. Spouses find it difficult dealing with the soldier leaving and then dealing with the return home. Children don't understand why their parent has changed.

Project New Hope is designed for any Veteran from any combat situation from Korea, Vietnam, Gulf War, Iraq and Afghanistan. All Veterans and their families are encouraged to find out about Project New Hope and attend a weekend.

The need for a weekend are facts like these: 25% of the homeless are combat Veterans, suicide for veterans age 20-24 are 4 times greater than civilians and 200 plus Veterans are disabled every day.

If you know of someone or you yourself have served in combat, please come to a

weekend retreat with Project New Hope. Both Vets and their families are encouraged to attend a weekend and they are held three times a year. The weekend is made up of professional counselors from the VA, volunteers, the vets and their families and the cost is FREE. Lodging and meals are provided for the weekend and donations are always welcome. The counselors are available 24/7 all weekend. Activities are counseling sessions, private, family time and group sessions with families and other Veterans.

Retreat locations are private, rural and in the great outdoors for fresh air and time to reflect and think things through. They are located at Camp Friendship-Clearwater Lake, Camp New Hope-Glazier Lake and Eden Wood Center-Birch Island Lake. Free time is also available to fish, boat, hike and visit with others at the weekend.

When you were in combat you had no control as to what happened to you, but with Project New Hope, what happens next, is in your control. Contact Project New Hope at www.ProjectNewHope.net for information.

Project New Hope is a project of the Lions of 5M9, in central Minnesota. Since it's start, money has been donated and raised by the Lions of 5M9 and other individuals, to get this project started. With a project like this, it takes a lot more financial aid to fund the weekends, advertise and spread the word beyond Minnesota. With that, the Lions of 5M9 have taken on a fundraiser to help raise funds for Project New Hope. 
